But the bands on this list didn't have to worry because they weren't real bands in the first place. Check out these fictional hit makers, but be prepared to get at least one song stuck in your head. The content of the Chipmunks ad, a fictional band created by Ross Bagdasarian in 1958, consisted of three singing chipmunks: Alvina, the troubled frontman; Simon, intellectual; and Theodore, darling. The trio were run by their human father, Dous seville. In fact, Dave Sevilla was a bagdasarian artist who electronically accelerated his own voice to higher-penetrating squeaky voices chipmunks. The process was so new and innovative that it won a Grammy for Engineering in 1959. Advertising The Chipmunks released a number of albums and singles, with Chipmunk Song (Christmas Don't Be Late) spending four weeks at the top of the charts in the late 1950s. They also starred in their own cartoons and animated films over the years. Hey, hey... Were the Monkees a real band or a fake? In 1965 auditions were held for folk and roll musicians to play band members on a new TV show called The Monkees. Actors Davy Jones and Micky Dolenz and musicians Mike Nesmith and Peter Tork were chosen as monkeys. The show won two Emmy Awards in 1967 and the band was so successful that they went on tour - with the Jimi Hendrix Experience as their opening act! The Monkees reached the top of the charts three times with hits I'm a Believer, The Last Train to Clarksville, and Daydream Believer. Although the show was canceled in 1968 and the band officially broke up in 1970, they continued recording and touring with some or all of the original members. Advertising stars of the Comic Archie and Saturday morning cartoon Archie Show, Archies was a garage band founded in 1968. Band members were Archie, Reggie, Jughead, Betty and Veronica. Producer Don Kirshner assembled a group of studio musicians to perform the band's songs, the most popular being Sugar, Sugar, which topped the pop charts in 1969 and was named Billboard Magazine's Song of the Year, the only time a fictional band has claimed the honor. Archies also reached the top 40 with Who's Your Kid?, Bang-Shang-A-Lang, and Jingle Jangle. Ad Read on to find other fictional bands with hits, including Blues Brothers. The Partridge Family, a popular TV show that aired in the early 1970s, focused on Shirley Partridge (Shirley Jones) and her offspring of five children who suddenly find themselves with a hit. The show recorded the life of the family on the road, where they performed concerts, as well as their home life. In support of the show, the producers released a series of Partridge Family albums. Although the music was originally created by studio musicians with Jones singing backup, David Cassidy, who played keith's eldest son, quickly persuaded the producers to let him sing the lead vocals. The ad show and band became overnight sensations, making Cassidy a teen idol. Among the band's most popular hits were the theme song C'Mon, Get Happy, I Woke Up in Love This Morning and I Think I Love You, which spent three weeks at number one in the late 1970s. Marcia, Marcia, Marcia... Are you singing that? The band known as The Kids from The Brady Bunch was made up of young actors from the mega popular sitcom, which originally aired from 1969 to 1974. During the show's run, the cast recorded several albums, including Christmas With the Brady and meet the Brady Bunch. None of the songs at the top of the charts, but some favorites include, Sunshine Day, Time to Change, and Keep On. All the kids sang on albums, and Barry Williams (Greg) and Maureen McCormick (Marcia) both continued their careers in music after the show ended. Advertising in April 1978, Saturday Night Live cast members John Belushi and Dan Aykroyd appeared on the show as the Blues Brothers. Dressed in black suits, fedoras, and sunglasses, Belushi sang singing as Joliet Jake Blues, while Aykroyd portrayed the Elwood Blues, singing backup and playing the accordion. Their first album, Briefcase Full of Blues, went double platinum and reached number one on the Billboard album chart. The recording produced two top 40 hits with covers of Sam and Dave's Soul Man and Chips' Rubber Biscuit. The Blues Brothers toured, even opening The Grateful Dead in December 1978. In 1980, Belushi and Aykroyd starred in the feature film The Blues Brothers, which chronicled the life of a fictional duo. The Belushi ad died in 1982, but the Blues Brothers live with Jim Belushi (John's brother), John Goodman, and other guests stepped in to fill his shoes. The Heights, a TV show about the same rock 'n' roll band, aired only one season in 1992. By day, the characters were working on the work, but at night it was The Heights. The series depicted the struggles of the band, as well as romance between the characters, and a new song was performed every week. The show's theme song, How to Talk to an Angel, which featured actor Jamie Walters on the main vocals, topped the charts in mid-November. Ironically, the show was canceled a week later.
